Mother India Photography School, in February offers a workshop in Mumbai, inspired by reading the wonderful book **Maximum City. Bombay lost and found** by Suketu Mehta, renowned writer and journalist, New Yorker by birth and Indian by adoption, a strong and intense story of the city through the stories that intertwine in the streets of the metropolis. The value of Maximum City, which is recommended reading to get into the spirit of the workshop is to know how to turn an enormous mass of people, homes, money, roads, local transport, in human stories, full of poetry.

The workshop has a duration of 8 days.

Each participant will present a selection of 10 photos in digital or printed form.

Send a resume by mail, explaining the level of photographic knowledge and travel.

DEADLINE: 27 January 2012

WORKSHOP:

February 19: Arrival of participants at the airport in Mumbai and Guest House accommodation.

Group dinner in well-known Leopold Cafe in Colaba.

February 20 - Beginning Workshop: Meeting with Shobha, presentation of the program and vision of the portfolio. The first three days of the workshop we will explore the city told by Suketu Mehta, moving on foot, with local buses and taxis, choosing an area every day, a religion or a story to be photographed.

From the fourth to fifth day we will move independently and to deepen their individual project.

The sixth day visit to the studios of Bollywood in Film City.

The seventh and eighth day: photo viewing, editing and layout of your photo project, which will be subsequently published on the site of Mother India School.

We recommend keeping a daily diary to share with the group at the end of the workshop.

At the conclusion of the workshop will return to Goa. Anyone wishing to join us, please register at the time of enrolment, for the travel arrangements and accommodations.

Please note that the night of Mumbai is full of life, a chance to keep shooting.

Shobha, was born in Palermo, Italy, daughter of Letizia Battaglia, now lives between Italy and India, where she likes to tell with photography and video, poetic stories, in invisible India that not makes the news. She works with a group of women surgeons: "Women for Women" - IPRASE (International Confederation for Plastic, Reconstructive and Aesthetic Surgery), violence against women in Bangladesh. In 2010 was awarded the CIVITAS, the courageous civil and social commitment, a symbol of friendship between Italy and India.

Exhibitions 2011: she is invited by Professor Zannier at the Venice Biennale, with a work on Nun survived the Pol Pot regime in Cambodia.
